

Statement from Curb Records Chairman Mike Curb, on the January 14, 2020 passing of long-time Curb Records CEO, Dick Whitehouse:

Curb Records long-time CEO, Dick Whitehouse, died last night (January 14, 2020) in California. Dick served for 55 years with the company, 35 as CEO, and was still serving as a board member and trustee at the time of his death. Curb Records Chairman Mike Curb shared the following about his friend and colleague, No one has ever done more for Curb Records than Dick Whitehouse. He was there from our start in 1964 and was responsible for some of the greatest artist signings in the history of our company. Dick was that rare record executive who understood the totality of our complicated industry. Dick played a major role in signing The Judds, Lyle Lovett, Junior Brown, Sawyer Brown, The Desert Rose Band and many others. I'm happy to say that Dick was surrounded by his wife Joan, his two daughters, Shelley and Debbie, and all of his grandchildren, sharing in what the family referred to as a living memorial. The family does not plan for a funeral service, however if anyone has any tributes to Dick, please send them in and we will put those together as a tribute to him and pass them along to the family. Dick Whitehouse was far and away the best executive in the history of Curb Records, which I'm told is the oldest company still owned by it's original owner, 55 years. Many of Dick's accomplishments are part of a recent book that I wrote with Dick's help.

Shelley asked me to write about an interesting moment that I experienced with Dick, of which there were many. When I was first starting the company as a teenager, I persuaded Dick to leave Capitol and join me as we tried to build a record company with no outside investment. Dick immediately was concerned that I was working seven days and seven nights a week and that I was going to damage my health if I continued doing that. He told me I needed to learn how to ski and then proceeded to tell me about his great skiing ability. As a birthday gift to Dick I offered to drive him to Mammoth, which was his favorite place to ski, even though I had never skied at that time. During the entire trip to Mammoth, Dick gave me all kinds of skiing tips and directions and also continued to talk about his incredible abilities as a skier. After several hours of driving, we finally got to the ski lodge and Dick said there is still time for me to go up to the top and ski down the hill and give you an idea of what skiing is like. I watched him from the lodge below, and Dick proceeded to get on the ski lift and go to the very top of the hill and wave at me. I waved back and he started down the hill and was skiing at an amazing pace, and he looked very professional. Unfortunately, just before he got to the bottom of the hill one of his skis turned sideways and he started flipping. The next thing I saw was Dick lying motionless on the ground in the snow. I immediately got in touch with the medical staff and we rushed up the hill. Dick was awake and lying there in great pain. We loaded him on a stretcher and took him to the hospital where he was diagnosed with various injuries, including a broken ankle. I stayed overnight at the hospital with him and the next day they told me they could release him if I could remove one of the seats in my car that I was driving at the time. With the help of three people, we removed one of the seats and I then spent the next day driving him home. The good news is that Dick was not telling me anything more about his skiing abilities and we were able to talk a little bit about the music business. Nevertheless, Dick was right because I'm still working seven days a week. One thing for sure though is that I've still never skied.

I am so sad to hear about Dick Whitehouse's passing. I had first gotten to know Dick when I was the Director of Press and Public Information for CBS Records, Nashville in the early 1980's. After leaving CBS to start my own management and PR firm in mid 1982, I began working with Wynonna and Naomi Judd along with producer, Brent Maher. In early January of 1983, my wife and I were on our honeymoon in L.A. I called Dick and asked him if he would have time to see me. I told him all about The Judds and Dick gave us a \$100.00 budget to do some simple guitar / vocal demos of three songs. I Fed-Xed the cassette to him and the next day he called me and said, "Woody, on a scale of 1 to ten this is an eleven!" Over the next few weeks we spoke about how he could be involved. I told him I wanted a Curb / RCA deal. Dick told me he only had Curb / Capitol and Curb / Warner Records arrangements at that time. I felt that there was inter-label competition with Capitol and Warner and I really pushed for a Curb / RCA deal. After a few months of negotiations Dick and I set up an audition in Joe Galante's office at RCA. After that audition, Brent, the Judds and I went to O'Charley's restaurant just off of Music Row while Dick met with Joe Galante. One hour later, Dick walked into the restaurant and announced, "Congratulations, you are now Curb / RCA artists!"

Over the next several years, Dick, Brent Maher and I worked closely together on A&R, promotion and PR. Of course, the act was a huge success!

After five years I sold my interest in their management to my partner and moved on with four other acts. One of those was Moe Bandy, who had been dropped from CBS Records one year prior. I approached Dick and told him that I knew how to orchestrate his come-back. I had brought Jerry Kennedy on board to produce Moe's project. By this time Dick had become my friend, mentor and cheerleader. Once again he believed in me and made the decision to give Moe a shot. I found the first two singles, "Till I'm Too Old To Die Young" and "You Haven't Heard The Last Of Me". The first one went #1 on Cashbox and the latter was top-five. We followed with the hit, "Americana" which became the theme song for George H.W. Bush's Presidential campaign.

I think back to these times with such warm fondness. Dick continued to follow me and my endeavors. In the 1990's I was managing country singer / songwriter, Terri Clark. Dick wanted to sign Terri but said he was unable to get the rest of the label staff to make the commitment. I went on to sign her to Mercury Records and had several gold and platinum projects with her. Throughout this time, Dick continued to be my cheerleader, friend and believer. Dick taught me so much and he and I gelled. He was one of my most valued friends and partners during my 35 years in the music business. Dick loved to tell the story that I had written the 1977 Hoyt Axton single, "You're The Hangnail In My Life And I Can't Bite You Off", which made him laugh.

I am so grateful to have had Dick Whitehouse play such a prominent role in my life and career. He was a one-in-a-million type of person and he had an incredible life. I am sad that he is gone, but I celebrate his life and all that he did with and for me.

God Bless the Whitehouse family in your time of grief. Please know that he impacted so many lives in such a positive way. Thank you Dick for all you did for me and for all you have meant to me!



VSDA Sponsoring Riot-Relief Effort

Collecting Used Tapes To Give L.A. Retailers

NEW YORK-Video distributors in Los Angeles have agreed to a plan to help area retailers whose stores were hurt in the recent riots to rebuild their businesses by collecting and dis-seminating used inventory donated by other dealers.

The L.A. Riot Relief Fund, a charity sponsored by the local chapter of the Video Software Dealers Assn., has asked distributors who operate in the Los Angeles market to collect used tapes donated by their custom-ers between now and Aug. 1. The tapes will then be shipped to Baker & Taylor's Los Angeles facility for redistribution to affected retailers.

Baker & Taylor will distribute the tapes at its own expense under the guidance of the local VSDA chapter.

According to the VSDA, approxi-mately 100 video stores in the Los Angeles area were looted or burned in the riots that followed the verdict

in the Rodney King case. The Riot Relief Fund has furnished distributors with a letter asking for donated tapes and is requesting that they send it to their accounts in the Los Angeles market. The used tapes are intended to help affected retailers restock their catalog inventory.

In addition to Baker & Taylor, dis-

tributors who operate in the Los Angeles market include Commtron, Ingram Entertainment, ETD, Video Products Distributors, and Major Video Concepts.

According to distributors planning

to participate in the program, the key to making the relief effort work is sorting out requests for assistance

"The major problem is putting a real number on the stores affected," one distributor source says. "We had 14 accounts whose stores were dam aged to one degree or another. And it looks like about half of those have no intention of going back into business at all. So how do you sort out who really needs help? Obviously, you don't want to be opportunistic in the face of something like this, but you don't want to be taken advantage of,

According to Baker & Taylor se nior VP James Ulsamer, "Who will get how much product will be sorted out by VSDA. We'll be guided by

Linda Plaks, owner of Moorpark Video and president of the Los Angeles VSDA chapter, could not be reached by press time.

Ulsamer says he cannot yet estimate how much the relief effort will cost Baker & Taylor because he does not yet know how much product will be involved. "The outbound freight could add up, but if we only have to ship once to each store it shouldn't be too bad. Also, some dealers may just want to come in and pick up the uct. We may also ask our shippers about donating part of their serv But our operations people are on top of this, so we're not expecting any

In other relief-related news, the Music Relief Fund has so far raised a total of \$81,000 for the relief effort, according to Sam Ginsburg of Abbey Road Distributors. New contributors Sony Music and the 64-store Spec's Music chain in Miami.

LIVE Seeks \$20 Million Advance From WEA

1st-Qtr. Revenue Losses Cut Further Into Cash Flow

NEW YORK-With a sharp decline in first-quarter revenues exacerbat-ing financial problems, LIVE Entertainment Inc. is attempting to relieve its current cash-flow crunch by obtaining a \$20 million advance from WEA Corp. on their recently formed home video distribution agreement.

In the three months that ended March 21, LIVE lost \$1.88 million, compared with a profit of \$1.79 million a year ago. Revenues plunged 21.3% to \$67.6 million from \$85.9 million in the year-earlier period.

The Van Nuys, Calif.-based company blames the decline in revenues and the net loss on the lack of major movie releases on home video, "disappointing results" from its retail chains, and higher interest and amortization costs.

LIVE needs a \$20 million advance on distribution fees from WEA to "meet the company's immediate li-quidity needs," according to the com-pany's quarterly financial statement.

Rodney Trovinger, senior VP and acting CFO, says the advance would be used for "operating needs and film acquisitions" at LIVE Home Video. WEA would recoup that advance

from distribution revenues at a rate of \$555,555 a month plus interest. The three-year WEA agreement for domestic distribution of home video replaces an expired pact with Uni Dis-

What is holding up the agreement on the advance is WEA's demand for "first priority security interest" in catalog titles under LIVE's children's video unit, Family Home Entertain-ment. Currently, LIVE's banks hold all rights to its video library as collat-eral for loans. Talks on the transfer of the rights are "still in progress, says Trovinger.

LIVE Home Video's sales declined an undisclosed amount in the first quarter, but the company says the unit made an operating profit. Inter-nationally the news was better: LIVE's VCL/Carolco subsidiary, a Munich-based home video distribution company, had an 11.8% increase in sales, mainly because of the video release of "Terminator 2: Judgment Day" in Germany. The movi produced by Carolco Pictures Corp., which owns 53% of LIVE.

LIVE's Specialty Retail Division, comprising the music chains Straw-

berries and Waxie Maxie, had a 7.7% decline in sales because of "continued weak economic conditions in the Northeastern U.S., continued liquid-ity problems that limited the amount of product available ... and the clo-sure of five stores during the last nine months of 1991." Same-store sales (for units open at least one year) fell 5% in the first quarter from a year ago. The company says retail profits were at "break-even" level.

Trovinger says LIVE is attempting to obtain a \$10 million line of credit to provide working capital for the retail

operations.

In a separate lending agreement, LIVE has \$50 million outstanding under a revolving credit facility with its banks. But that expires in December and LIVE is trying to line up some

thing to replace it.

LIVE also missed a \$7.9 million interest payment due May 15 on its \$110 million worth of subordinated debt. The company has hired two investment firms to explore the possi-ble restructuring of the debt. In the ntime, LIVE took advantage of a

Sony Sets Japanese Launch Of MiniDisc Portable Units

TOKYO—Sony will introduce two MiniDisc portable units in Japan Nov. 1, the company announced here May

One unit will feature record/playback capabilities and will have a target retail price of 80,000 yen (\$620), while a playback-only model will sell in the 60,000-yen (\$465) range. Monthly production estimates for the two battery-powered decks are not yet available.

The firm says it plans to start sell-ing MD units in overseas markets by Christmas, with prices and other details yet to be announced.

So far, 22 hardware manufactur-ers, eight software-related companies, and 10 blank-media manufacturers have signed licensing agreements

for MD technology.
In contrast to Matsushita's May 6 unveiling of its RS-DC10 home-use DCC deck, which goes on the market here Sept. 21, Sony displayed proto-type portable MD units in what could be seen as an attempt to steal some of Matsushita's thunder. A large, commercial-use MD deck was used to demonstrate the MD format's capa-

Also worth noting is that, at 135,000 yen (\$1,046), the RS-DC10 is significantly more expensive than the MD portables, although Sony has yet to make an announcement regarding a home MD unit.

Kozo Ohsone, a Sony senior man-aging director responsible for audio

development, says the firm believes the new format will penetrate the market faster than CDs due to the MD's recording capability.

In order to ensure software sup-ort for MD—which uses the Serial Copy Management System to prevent multigeneration digital copying— Sony announced it has completed development of premastering and mastering equipment for prerecorded MD
